Philanthropy Report



Academic Chairman's Report

12X Summer Academic Report

Despite a raucous 12X, I am happy to report that Tri-Kap has maintained its tradition of academic excellence. Many brothers took classes together in fascinating subjects unrelated to their majors, from developmental psychology to astronomy, allowing them to engage academically together as a brotherhood. Academic performance even extended beyond the classroom to our hallowed halls, from our weekly study room sessions to frequent intellectual discussions between games of pong.

This summer also provided unique opportunities for our brothers to both learn from the local community and apply their knowledge to improve it. As part of their music class, **Chris Richardson '14** and **Scott Nelson '14** traveled around Vermont and New Hampshire researching music culture in the Upper Valley, from local jazz festivals to square dancing in remote New Hampshire towns. **Andres Ramirez '14** conducted public policy research on regionalization and shared services between four towns in Vermont, developing a system in which they could share amenities such as EMS, Police Force, seasonal equipment, water works, and other services. His research will soon to be published and used by the town managers to determine whether regionalization is a viable option.

Given the recent controversy and hostility towards Greek life, the talk is sure to spark some needed discourse regarding the strengths of a fraternity. In Memoriam

William Edwards Buckingham Jr. '47

William Edwards Buckingham Jr. '47 died in Bellevue, Washington, on January 27th, 2011.

Having grown up in Cheshire, Connecticut, William attended Hamden (Connecticut) High School and was one of the few civilian freshmen in the summer of 1943.

In college he played intramural hockey, joined Kappa Kappa Kappa and was active in the Outing Club. His studies were interrupted by two years of service in the Air Force. Later, he returned to graduate from Thayer School in 1949, and eventually found employment at Pratt & Whitney in Connecticut before moving to Washington.

His major projects involved engines for the B-52, F-111, 747 and the Caravelle. His hobbies were golf, tennis and auto restoration. He is survived by his wife and five children.

Loren Karacki '57

Loren Karacki '57 died suddenly of complications from multiple system atrophy on April 29th, 2012. "Larry" had been living in Rockville, Maryland, at the time of his death.

Though he grew up in Kenosha, Wisconsin, his parents had emigrated from Lithuania earlier in the 1900s. In high school he was a skilled defensive lineman and scholar.

While at Dartmouth, he majored in sociology, played football and was a member of Kappa Kappa Kappa. Following Dartmouth Larry continued his studies in a master's of sociology program at Rutgers University. Larry pursued many different careers in sociology before settling into a long-term career as a research analyst for the Federal Bureau of Prisons until he retired in 2001. He then spent his leisure hours pursuing his passions—reading, antiquing and collecting antique beer advertisements.

He is survived by his wife, Susanne, sons Peter and Timothy, brother Alvin and many loving nieces and nephews.

Eric Alan Jones '68

Eric Alan Jones '68 died on December 4th, 2011, at the Life House in San Diego following a lengthy illness.

Eric came to Dartmouth from Wayland, Massachusetts. He was extraordinarily active at Dartmouth, serving on the class executive committee and in the

Undergraduate Council, performing in the Glee Club and Injunaires, and founding the Dartmouth Religious Liberals Club. Eric was also a member of Kappa Kappa Kappa.

While an undergraduate he directed several musicals at Hanover High School, and after graduation, continued there as a teacher. He also worked at the Dartmouth Travel Bureau, beginning a long association with the travel industry. In 1973, he co-founded a summer theater program in the area, which became the active North Country Community Theater.

In 1976, Eric moved to Boston, first to work with a travel agency and eventually to establish his own company, First In Travel. In 1997 he moved to San Diego, where he established another travel agency. He had been in declining health for several years, but never lost his joie de vivre.

A favorite quote of his was, "Life is not about waiting for the storms to pass...it's about learning to dance in the rain." He is survived by his long-time companion, Michael Trueblood.

Charles Thomas Drake '73

Charles Thomas Drake '73 died on November 26th, 2011, at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center in Lebanon, New Hampshire, after a battle with cancer.

A native of West Lebanon, New Hampshire, Charlie came to Dartmouth from Lebanon High School, where he was the captain of the football and the track teams. He was quarterback of the Lebanon High School football team that won the New Hampshire state championship in 1968.

At the College he majored in psychology, played intramural sports and was the business manager of the Aegis during his junior year. Charlie was a member of Kappa Kappa Kappa and served on his fraternity's rush committee. He volunteered for two years as a tutor in the Upper Valley Tutorial Program.

After graduation, Charlie returned to Lebanon, where he taught for several years in elementary school, after which he established Drake Builders and became an accomplished carpenter.

He is survived by his wife, Kristi, and daughters Ziven and Farrell. Memorial contributions may be made in Charlie's name to the Norris Cotton Cancer Center at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center, 1 Medical Center Drive, Lebanon, NH 03756.
