As inflation further raises prices, and thus our expenses, to new levels, our current system of dues becomes more and more outdated. We anticipate making necessary adjustments to dues and room rent in the fall to stay present with the current economy.

### **Corporations Update**

The Board of Directors met for the Annual Meeting on May 21st in the GOTE room during Green Key Weekend lest the old traditions fail. Board members physically present'included myself, James McKim '83, Terry Lowd '66, M att Brown '05, and Michael Brasher '10. On the audio bridge'line were Sunil Bhagavath '03 and Adam Patinkin '07.

I am happy to say, the state of the brotherhood is strong. We initiated 26 new members into the brotherhood. F rom where I sat, it was a fine looking class. Each took the opportunity to sign their name in the same Membership book in which most of us signed our names. The undergraduates had it re-bound, so it looks as good as it has in years. The signatures of those who did not have the opportunity to add their "John Hancock" to this book are being added as special pages into the book.

Terry reported that the financial situation looks better than last year with a total balance in our checking account of \$8,406.85. There is a fair balance in the Third Century Fund account being used for physical plant improvements. More on that later.

We do need to find another administration mechanism as CMA has decided to not continue providing the service to us. Terry and I will be pursuing options.

Adam and Sunil reported that the Kappa Kampaign has its infrastructure set and financials ready to be submitted to the College for a loan, which would allow us to begin con-

struction. I am in the process of scheduling a meeting with the College to proceed with our plans. I am anticipating approval by late June, which will lead to presentations to the town in July and August. With luck, we'll be in construction by Fall term. The attendees approved the continuation of the current Board members whose terms are expiring. A t our next Board meeting, we will elect officers for the coming year If any of you are interested in joining the Board, please let me know.

As you can see from the other reports in this issue, the undergraduates are doing great things. They continue to be held in high regard by the student body and the administration and hold leadership roles on campus. The party the night before the meeting was, as usual, packed and very successful.

There was much discussion about what we can do to foster more interaction between alumni and undergraduates. Ideas ranged from continuation of the monthly emails from the President to f inding out what alumni interests are and matching them with undergraduates who have the same interests. M att Brown '05, is heading the revised Alumni Relations (formerly Reunions) Committee that worked on this and has already organized an alumni Pong Tournament which raised considerable funds at the 2011 Reunions this year.

Reunions themselves were particularly successful. The House was crawling with younger alums ('06 and prior classes) that came to relieve the Kappa experience. A handful of "older" alumns showed up as well – a couple of '81s and a number of '86s.

The pong tournament was a raving success, thanks to Richard Park 'oı who helped organize it! There was lots of pre-tournament practice that started Thursday evening and was going strong when I arrived Friday mid-afternoon.

"We live in Atlanta, Georgia and my husband's father was a graduate of Dartmouth and a member of Kappa Kappa Kappa Fraternity. Mr. Brennan, who is deceased, went to Dartmouth for 1 year after H.S. graduation, then served in the 10th Mountain Division, and then finished at Dartmouth in 1948 after the war (he was recorded as graduating with the class of '46 due to his service).

His story is remarkable and one to make his alma mater proud. Mr. Brennan did not talk about his war experience very much, says my husband. After doing all this research, his family now has a better idea of what he actually went through, which was incredible. His company ('C') was the first of the 86th regiment to take Riva Ridge. Just reading about the physical challenges they faced makes one shake their head in disbelief.

Our daughter, Lauren, is applying for a 10th Mtn. Division Descendants' Scholarship, and must do a community service project to support the 10th Mtn Division. In memory of her grandfather, and in honor of all our soldiers now serving in the 10th, she is coordinating an 'Adopt a Platoon' project."

#### Philanthropy Chairman's Report

At the event, kids had the options of getting their faces painted, bowling, playing in a moon bounce, and hunting for Easter eggs. Pizza and the smashing of a piñata marked the end of the event. This would not have been possible without the support of the brotherhood and the Greek community. The brotherhood donated its time and effort while other organizations helped monetarily through co-sponsorship. All in all, the Easter Open H ouse was a huge success this year and appropriately displayed what the brothers can accomplish in terms of philanthropy.

In the winter, we started fundraising efforts for the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life. After two and a half terms of selling grilled cheese and asking for personal donations, we raised over \$1,300 for the event. On May 14th, we went to the relay with a team of 15 brothers and walked laps for the fight against cancer.

Brothers have also found other ways to contribute to the community . Many members are involved in programs like DREAM and Bg Brothers Big Sisters, two organizations that uphold the goal of mentoring children from the area. On May 4th, brothers helped take down supplies af ter the Red Cross Blood Drive. The house has also recently co-sponsored a Cinco de M ayo benefit with Project RightChoice in order to establish clean drinking water and sanitation facilities in developing countries. Overall, the brotherhood has been very active in volunteering and has accrued over 300 hours of community service. We plan to maintain, if not strengthen, our philanthropic efforts this upcoming year.

Following the plans Marcel and our former president C ameron Sharman '11 had drawn up, the bathroom was the focus of improvement this term.
