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From Our Chapter President

Greetings Kappas!

As fall term comes to a close, I would like to address several pressing issues currently facing our brotherhood. First, the Alumni Executive Board and all of the alumni who have consistently supported TriKap throughout the years deserve commendation for their longstanding loyalty and commitment to our house. In the past few months, several alumni who have visited the house have expressed dismay at the lack of maintenance in our physical plant. I apologize on behalf of all of our current brothers for the poor upkeep that our treasured house deserves. Although I share their concerns, I would like to offer all the concerned alumni reassurance that we have taken strong measures to ensure that the house is maintained in a proper and respectable manner.

The house managers have drafted a clean grounds plan of action, which includes several measures to address specific problems. Brothers are assigned specific parts of the house, which they are responsible for keeping clean on a daily basis. In addition, we have removed public trash receptacles, which were posing a problem with our dogs. Most importantly, however, our brothers understand that the house, which for many alumni is the only remaining physical link to the brotherhood, should be treated with great reverence and respect. I hope that those alumni who expressed consternation accept our apologies and trust that TriKap is in good hands.

Unfortunately, we are facing new problems as a result of the Fuller Audit, increasing property taxes and very high insurance rates. As many of you know, the College has mandated that each Greek house undergo renovations and repairs to meet with minimum stan-

dards of safety. Our Alumni Executive Board has been relentless in exploring ways to meet this new fiscal challenge to maintain private ownership of the house. In addition, the undergraduates are also facing challenges to the treasury because of increasing property taxes and insurance rates. As a result of the Town of Hanover reassessing our property value, our property tax has more than doubled in the past year. Our insurance has likewise seen more than a 200% increase. Anticipating these increases, we have been saving money to meet these fiscal requirements. Unfortunately, the undergraduates have no capacity to contribute to the Fuller Audit as a result of higher bills, so I would strongly encourage alumni to maintain their support of our brotherhood.

I am also proud to report that TriKap is excelling in the performance standards set by the College. Last spring, our brotherhood received awards for achievement in brotherhood, inclusivity and scholarship. In addition, individual members garnered honors at the ceremony as well. Sunil Bhagavath, '03 won the Greek Man of the Year Award for his contributions to the entire CFS community. Stuart Leung, '05 was honored as the Emerging Leader of the Year and also served as the Interfraternity Council Summer President. Lastly, Jason Lee, '05 and Imran Sharih, '04 earned awards for academic achievement. With the replacement of Minimum Standards with individual Action Plans, TriKap has already achieved lofty goals and set the standard for Greek houses on campus.

We have tried as best as possible to maintain and strengthen our established relationships with service organizations and, as the brotherhood has taken the initiative, we have explored opportunities to create new relationships.

This past year, we continued our teamwork with traditional partners such as the American Red Cross, which holds a blood drive once a term. Our house provided volunteers for setup and cleanup for this effort. We continued our involvement with wood-crew, which provides wood for heating to underprivileged Upper Valley homes.

In addition to these activities in the summer, we also explored new avenues of service. We had a very successful car wash in order to raise money for charity and cultivated a strong relationship with DREAM, an organization on campus that provides mentoring for inner city children. With DREAM, Kappas have donated their time and energy in many ways – the brotherhood has helped raise funds, assisted in programs (such as the recent scavenger hunt), and provided our home as the central meeting place for their activities.
